#### Pause for thought with Rev Lorraine

Recent years have witnessed a flood of books offering variations of a formula that will bring happiness and fulfillment. Indeed, to the one who holds the key, who knows the secret...to the wise and intelligent, life's oyster opens itself and all manner of treasures await. Sounds attractive? Many would agree, as evidenced by the number of such books that follow one another in succession week after week, month after month, on the various bestseller lists.

Yet for us as Christians it is our calling "Let go and let God", looks good on a bumper sticker or tee-shirt, but the reality is much more difficult, because it is far easier to add to a resume than to stand before the mirror naked. It is far simpler, or so it seems, to work harder to be loveable than to recognize how beloved we already are.

The devotional writer Henri Nouwen once said, "When you are able to create a lonely place in the midst of your actions and concerns, then somehow, slowly, your successes and failures lose their power over you."

Years ago, there was a priest who spent a considerable amount of time, money, and energy overseas working towards a PhD. When he arrived home and began working as a parish priest the word arrived that he had successfully passed his dissertation and could now be called Dr. Robertson. When the mother of a young girl told her daughter the news, the girl looked at the priest with wonder and asked, "Does this mean you can operate on people now?" The mother was quick to explain, "No, dear, Fr. Brian is the kind of doctor who doesn't help anyone." Immediately realizing what had just escaped from her lips, the mother turned to the priest red faced and hoped the floor would swallow her up.

It is no wonder, then, that in Matthew's Gospel 11: 28-30 the most comforting and most sublime words ever uttered are written "Come to me," Jesus invites, "all you who are weary and heavy-laden, and I will refresh you. Take my yoke upon you and learn from me, for I am gentle and humble in heart, and you will find rest for your souls. For my yoke is easy, and my burden is light."

"Nothing I do is ever enough!" Yes, that's right! And when we recognize that truth, the sooner we can embrace the deeper reality that God already knows us more fully than we would like to admit, and still calls us "beloved."

You and I, we are not God...and we don't have to try to be. You and I can dare to let go of the heavy, wearisome yokes we put on ourselves and allow others to thrust upon us, and instead take up that blessed yoke that is no burden, the

yoke of acceptance of our own beloved self in Christ, the yoke of acceptance of the beloved nature of other weary, heavy-laden ones still striving all around us. "Come to me," Jesus invites, "come, my beloved". **Rev Lorraine**

It was back on 8 May that a group of us from church combined with a working party from the MCTC to take our back garden in hand. Thanks to all who took part. The improvement is massive. The garden and yard are a great play resource for children but the enhancement of the space has tempted people out there on several occasions since to drink coffee and chat and the work was done in time for the open gardens day on 11 June. To the left of the garden area, the yard now boasts a couple of raised beds with some healthy looking courgette plants (?), some beans and tomatoes and some lettuces which are now feeding Martin's grateful tortoise. Our efforts at maintaining and improving the space for all users are still a bit fitful. If you love gardening and doing things in the outdoors, please let us know. It would be great to have a regular gardening group.

#### **Ecochurch: from Silver towards Gold**

Firstly, our Silver Award plaque has finally arrived! While we have no immediate plans to process round New Town in an open top bus to display it, it is an achievement which lots of church members have contributed to in various ways. Thanks everyone. How to move things on towards a Gold Award? Well there are a couple of things in particular that we are working on as part of that ambition.

#### Progress on moving to renewable energy

As we have discussed before the 'St Stephens for the Future' project includes our intention to reduce the carbon footprint of our buildings by moving to renewable energy. You might remember that when we last estimated it, we were producing 19 tonnes of CO2 per annum. The ambitious move to renewables depends upon us raising and donating money and applying for grants to replace our gas boilers with air source heat pumps supported by an array of photovoltaic panels and storage batteries. With the help of a heating contractor, we have almost reached the point of being able to budget more accurately for the panels, the pumps and all the complex gear that will be needed to form an interconnected system. Once we have a realistic idea of what it will cost, we can begin to start to fund-raise, apply for grants and seek donations. So watch this space for more news.

#### The lifestyle challenges of climate crisis

The other challenge we face is a more immediate and personal one. How does the lifestyle of each of us contribute to halting the destruction wrought by climate heating? "Lifestyle" is one the five aspects of the EcoChurch Award Scheme and it seems like an area which we can improve on. We are all aware of Climate crisis and we know that our choices affect the sustainability of life on Earth. As God's people we should value the Creation, and make it part of our Christian commitment to treat our environment thoughtfully, for the good of all.

So, how are we doing in this aspect of our Christian commitment? To help us reflect together on this, we are launching a <u>lifestyle survey</u>. Also, each week we will be sharing suggestions for 'Just One Thing' we can do to slow climate change.

The <u>lifestyle survey</u>: to get a feel for how much we are each building creation thinking into our daily lives, each member will be invited to complete a simple and anonymised questionnaire. The idea is to hold a mirror up to our daily

practice so that when we put the results together, we will be able to see how far we have come and perhaps where we could make more progress. You will be sent a <u>digital copy of the questionnaire</u> if you receive this magazine by email. If you don't, then we will distribute some paper copies. It isn't compulsory but we hope very much you will support this initiative. We will report back on what it shows in due course.

Just One Thing for Creation: Sometimes it's hard to know what to do about climate crisis—it seems so big. What can one person do to make a difference? So, appearing on the screen in the lobby and before the service will be a weekly prompt headed: 'Just One Thing' suggesting some practical things you could do each week, to tread more lightly on the sacred space that is our beautiful and bountiful home planet. Here is one such suggestion:

Repair, re-use, and recycle! Sometimes it's really better value to repair a garment or bag if the zip's gone – the clothes repair shop in Eld Lane is excellent and keeps items out of landfill and the computer shop on Bourne Road might be able to fix your laptop or PC rather than buying a replacement. There's lots of other things we can reuse rather than simply "dump".



#### Camping at Torrington Friday 7th July to Sunday 9th July 2023

We have booked a return to Thorrington for our annual camping. We have the indoor accommodation which can sleep 14 people (in bunk beds, with handy toilet and kitchen facilities) and then the fallen log campsite which is a lovely big open site set in the woods.

The weekend is open to all ages and some people come for two or one night, one day or just the Saturday evening. It is really flexible and open to all ages whether on our own or in a family. Everyone is welcome.

The plan for the weekend is very relaxed with arrival at the site from 5:30 on the Friday evening (it is fine to arrive anytime after this, but NOT before as there will be no warden on site). In previous years we:

- Had lovely take away fish and chips
- Relaxed around the fire while enjoying a sip of your favourite tipple. Some people sing and play any instruments they bring.
- Played sports.
- Sat reading and drinking tea, chatting and got to know each other.
- Completed in a go karting challenge and played human table football.
- Went on a nature walk.
- Had a group BBQ.
- Had a small service on Sunday morning in the outdoors.

On Saturday usually we have a group BBQ with people bringing food to share.

We break camp normally around lunch time on Sunday. Please also note that there is a noise curfew from 11pm-7am.

All the above is very relaxed there is never any pressure to do anything. People dip in and out of whatever they fancy. People bring their own food and we find this works well. We have a fully working kitchen in the indoor accommodation. There are showers and toilets on site. Cost guide - The bunk bed is around £15.00 per person per night with the camping £7 per person per night and free for under 5's. The indoor accommodation is split into different size rooms. There is additional small costs if you do some activities.

The Papillon has two rooms with two bunk beds, one room with four bunk beds, and one room with six bunk beds. Please note you will need sleeping bags or sheet and duvet for the indoor accommodation. If visiting during the day the charge is £1 per person.

If you haven't been please have a think and feel free to ask us if you have any questions. We even have some tents people can borrow, and is cost is an issue please talk to us, we would rather people were included and we don't want money to be a barrier.


