#### **Rectors reflection**

#### Passion and Post Easter Thoughts

I am writing this before Easter, but it is for the April magazine which comes after Easter. We are privileged because we are post Easter people. We mark the events of Christ's passion knowing Christ has risen. He has won the victory over sin and death. It was not like that for the first disciples.

Bearing that in mind, I thought I would give you a few thoughts that are part of the Passion story but speak into post Easter, even post twenty first century, where what seemed negative turn positive for us as we believe and trust in Jesus our Saviour. These are thoughts we shared recently at our Evening Housegroup.

Our first thoughts were about Jesus' blood. Matt 27 reports how Pilate said that Jesus was innocent of any crime that would deserve death so the crowd should release him. However, persuaded by the high priests and elders, they loudly roar out 'crucify him.' Pilate could see he was not going to get anywhere with them and there would soon be a riot. So, giving in, he washed his hands to declare he was innocent of 'Jesus' blood, so that made them responsible instead. In those times, someone had to take responsibility to implement a death sentence. Over eagerly, they answered 'His blood be on us and on our children.'

Sadly, especially in the world war years, so called Christian countries used that declaration as justification to persecute and kill Jewish people, not realising that their actions also showed the evil in their own hearts. As they harmed fellow human beings, they also became guilty of crime against Jesus and guilty of his blood. Even though Pilate refuted his guilt, he too was guilty of allowing this unjust death to happen. Indeed, we all miss the point if we do not see that all of us are guilty of shedding the blood of Christ, because in our own human nature, we are all creatures of sinful thought and actions. It is only through Jesus' blood that brings us into God's intimate presence, as clean and whole restored people.

The pre-Easter message was that in a sombre way, the 'blood of Jesus was on us all.'



BUT the post Easter message is that joyfully, as we accept it, 'the blood of Jesus is on us all,' in a positive way saving us from sin and death. Just as the Passover lamb's blood was sprinkled on the doors so that the whole household knew life, so we know God's love and life through the shedding of Christ's blood, and we remember that posi-

tive every time we take communion. As an old song put it: 'It's your blood

that's shed for me, it's your blood that gives us life.'

Our second thoughts were about 'Jesus as King.' They convicted and mercilessly mocked Jesus for claiming to be the 'King of the Jews.' The soldiers, seeing his sorry state, crowned him with thorns, a royal-coloured robe, and a makeshift staff, then bowed down to him before hitting him over the head. At the crucifixion, others joined in the mocking, saying if he was King, he should come down from the cross, then they would follow him. To their chagrin though, the sign on the cross declared him as 'King of the Jews.' The Bible declares that he is even more than that -he is Lord of the universe. Revelation describes him as 'Lord of Lords and King of Kings.' At the end of the ages, humanity will see his true glory and reverse the mocking. Instead, 'every knee will bow before him.'

Today, people continue to mock Jesus by blaspheming his name, by jeering at or persecuting his followers, or ignoring or rejecting his claim to be Saviour and Lord. I would suggest that our pre and post Easter response is to recognise where we mock him when we accept him as Saviour but still live to please ourselves, rather than seeking God's ways. He calls us to recognise him as Christ and Lord of all and worship him now in song and action, to be an Easter people throughout the year.

Happy pre, post and present Easter.

# Churchwarden's letter

Dear friends,

#### Changes is a'comin'

Sometimes things just seem to be going on much as they have done with not much sign of change but now is not such a time. We have been in a vacancy for eight months since Lorraine's departure. Vacancies can be just a time of waiting but actually a lot has been happening in the meantime. The relationship between the three churches has deepened given a further push forward by the recent awayday and working on the parish profile together. Many of you will have contributed to that profile. Café church is evolving and attracting more people. Messy church and the Hub continues to thrive. Louise is making the new role of community worker her own. Belinda has been priested and Dan prepares to apply to take on his own new challenges.

### Interviewing for priest-in-charge

And now there is the possibility that the priest-in-charge vacancy may be coming to an end.Last Sunday, we read out the following message from Archdeacon Ruth about the decision to interview a candidate for incumbent at St Stephen's and St Margaret's. She writes:

"The interview panel met last week and we were very pleased to receive a strong application for the post of Rector of St Stephen's and Priest-in-Charge of St Margaret's. We will therefore be going ahead with an interview on Tuesday 23rd April. There will be more information about that soon, particularly for Ministry Team members and PCC members, who we would like to involve in the interview day. The interview panel (which AD Ruth chairs) includes your parish reps (John Clifton, Annie Porteous-Butler, Ron Carr and Linda English) as well as Area Dean Erwin Lammens and Deanery Lay Chair Lynne Gettings. Please do pray for the panel, for the candidate and for your parishes as we discern together God's will for your parishes and for the candidate's future ministry.

Many thanks, Archdeacon Ruth."

The interview panel were in agreement that it is not just about whether a candidate is strong but whether they are a 'good fit' for the two churches. Yes, please pray for the interview panel and indeed the candidate to be given wisdom in this important decision for our churches and communities.

#### Being an inclusive church.

I was attracted to St Stephen's years ago because of the welcome that was given to me and to all comers. At the recent PCC, there was a unanimous decision to make that policy of welcome more explicit by seeking to sign up as an "Inclusive Church". What does that mean? This is the Inclusive Church statement:

"We believe in inclusive church – a church which celebrates and affirms every person and does not discriminate. We will continue to challenge the church where it

continues to discriminate against people on grounds of disability, economic power, ethnicity, gender, gender identity, learning disability, mental health, neurodiversity, or sexuality. We believe in a Church which welcomes and serves all people in the name of Jesus Christ; which is scripturally faithful; which seeks to proclaim the Gospel afresh for each generation; and which, in the power of the Holy Spirit, allows all people to grasp how wide and long and high and deep is the love of Jesus Christ."

It doesn't mean that we are already doing everything we should to make things equal for all. It means that we promise to to do all we can to make that a reality. #### Looking ahead to the Annual Parish General meeting

Our meeting in May is a time for reviewing the past year but also looking forward and electing people who are called to serve on the PCC who will represent everyone and do their very best to look after the church and pursue the church's mission in New Town. Maybe you are someone who would like to consider that role or to nominate someone else? Talk to a churchwarden or PCC member to find out more. Or perhaps you are thinking that you would like to be more active in others ways. What is there to do? We have lacked a sacristan for some time now. That is a person that helps prepare for services by setting out what is needed for communion and lights candles. Making teas and coffees after services is much appreciated. Our gardens need regular love and care to look their best. These are just a few examples.

#### Moving sideways...

I have been a churchwarden for the past 4 years which has been an extraordinary privilege. I now feel that it is time to pass on that role to someone else. I am not planning to go away or just sit at the back though! Instead, I will be doing the day-to-day work to push forward on the energy project and the church roof repair, reporting back to the standing committee and the PCC. I will be writing more about that (DV) in future magazines.

#### **Sunday wardens**

But Martin and the next churchwarden could sure do with a bit of back up... The PCC agree that it would be good to equip some more people to do what churchwarden's do on a Sunday to make things run smoothly. The role is bigger than that, but we are just talking about things like unlocking the church, making sure the worship area is set up, giving notices, checking all the jobs on the rota are covered etc. PCC members were asked to think about if they might do that perhaps once every couple of months. Interested? That's work in progress.

Clearly, for very good reasons, a number of people are unable to walk and if they have to travel by car, but are able to walk a short distance, might they consider parking a few hundred yards away and walking the last bit and / or slightly staggering their arrival and departure to see if we might reduce the congestion in the car park and on Canterbury Road a little that way.

As you will no doubt be aware, we are working to achieve our Gold Echo Church Award (we already have our bronze and silver awards); we have some big plans in progress which will support this, but if we can also reduce the number of people travelling here by car this will also contribute positively towards this. If there is anything that we can do to support this (such as more bicycle parking etc), please do let us know and we will see what we can do.

We will then return the walk back to the train station with the trains at 2 mins to the hour. Everyone is welcome.

## Camping at Thorrington Friday 5th July to Sunday 7th July 2024

We have booked a return to Thorrington for a camping extravaganza. I think this is our ninth year of going. However, if you have not been we would love you to join us for all or part of our weekend away.

We have the indoor accommodation which can sleep 14 people (in bunk beds) and then the fallen log campsite which is a lovely big open camp site set in the



woods. Thorrington is a lovely quite big campsite on the way to Brightlingsea, it is the scout campsite, but they allow us to use it as a church group.

The weekend is open to all ages and some people come for two nights, one night, one day or just the Saturday evening. It is really flexible it doesn't matter if you are on our own or in a family. Everyone is welcome.

The rough plan for the weekend is arrive around 4.30pm on the Friday set up camping and then have some fish and chips which Sheila Poole as offered to collect and bring to the site for us. Nearer the time we will place an order.

We then relax around the fire while enjoying a sip of your favourite tipple. If we are lucky some people sing and play any instruments they bring.

The Saturday is relaxed and we will probably book some of the onsite activities . We also set up some sport activities on our site. Some people sit and read; some people go for a walk. If we are lucky Chris Poole may arrange a nature walk. For tea we arrange a group BBQ and share food which people bring. This is sometimes where people join us for the evening. We sometimes then attend the large campfire for a sing song, run by the site wardens before returning to our site for a more relaxed fire.

On Sunday we may attend the "Scout's Own" 15 minute outside act of worship before normally breaking camp after lunch. The site is around 20 minute drive from our church.

All the above is very relaxed there is never any pressure to do anything. People dip in and out of whatever they fancy. People bring their own food and we find this works well. We have a fully working kitchen in the indoor accommodation. There are showers and toilets on site.

We are still finalising the prices per person per night but think this will be £8 per person if you are camping and over 5 under-fives are free. The indoor accommodation is likely

to be £15 per person per night. This indoor accommodation has increased quite a lot over the last few years. These prices will hopefully include two activities we will book to do on the Saturday. We really want people to come and have a small fund set aside that people can access if you the cost is difficult.






